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# 2013 Society Membership Fees: REMINDER

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## **FEBRUARY MEETING**

At the commencement of the February Meeting the President, Dieter Mylius, complimented the members who had helped set up and organise the refreshments for the **Christmas Social** in December which the Committee felt to have been a very successful evening. The event had been attended by a little over seventy members and a few visitors with apparently quite an amount of specimens and other mineralogical material changing hands.

John Chapman announced that he had been informed by Arthur Roffey about a collector living in Coonabarabran who had been collecting **zeolites** from the **Garrawilla** area for over twenty years and was looking to sell an amount of them. John Chapman suggested that a number of members might care to take a trip out to Coonabarabran one weekend to see what the collector had available and also to look around the area. Among other places of interest in the area the Brian Head collection on display at the **Crystal Kingdom** in the town would be an obvious venue to visit along the way.

A number of members indicated an interest in taking such a trip and John Chapman would make further inquiries and inform members of any plans in due course.

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With no more announcements to be made the Meeting was handed over to John Rankin who was to introduce, display and describe a large number of photographs of mineral specimens taken at the **2012 Tucson Gem and Mineral Show** by Society member Paul Melville. The theme for the 2012 Show had been on the **Minerals of Arizona**.

Complementing the photographic montage members had commendably responded to the invitation to bring in specimens from Arizona to display to the Meeting and an impressive and varied array of minerals were set out for examination.

#### Minerals of Arizona

John Rankin commenced his presentation by describing something of the background to the collecting of minerals in Arizona which has a large number of working, closed or worked-out mines and in the number of these and total mineral production can be compared to New South Wales.

Arizona is in the south-west of the United States and has a similar population to New South Wales of about 6.4 million (Arizona) to 7.2 million (NSW) whereas the population of Tucson of about half a million dwarfs Broken Hill with about 20,000. The land area of Arizona is some 300,000 square kilometers compared to 800,000 for NSW.

Collectors have been active in Arizona from the earliest years of mining but particularly from the 1930s having managed to preserve a large number of examples of the minerals found there. The collecting activities have also involved collectors from the 1950s onwards investigating old, discontinued or abandoned mines to recover more specimens. Arizona has produced sixty-four type minerals compared to New South Wales's twenty. Apart from large deposits of copper and lead in the State there is also molybdenum, vanadium, gold and silver.

Starting in the late 1850s there were first a number of gold and then by 1860 silver 'rushes' in the State. Given the low European population of Arizona at that time, its proximity to Mexico and with a common border it was the more convenient for American mine operators to employ labourers from Mexico to travel in to work the mines for a few months, generating amounts of ore which the operator could then set about smelting. Apparently in those early years friction would sometimes occur with the Mexican labourers attacking the American supervisors and making off over the border with the concentrated ore. Another problem was that the local Apaches would be likely to attack either group.

By 1861 five forts had been established in Arizona to attempt to control the Apache problem but when the American Civil War started in that year all American troops were pulled out of the state and the Apaches had free rein for a while. Virtually all mining was discontinued until copper mines started opening up in the 1870s.

Whilst the production of copper in 1963 in Arizona considerably surpassed that being produced at that time in New South Wales, most of the mines shown on maps of Arizona had been opened up in the late 1800s and very early 1900s and have been worked out or closed. However a number of the larger deposits and mines have continued operating or were opened up further and Arizona is still the leading producer of copper in the U.S. today. As he spoke John Rankin continued to show images first of maps of Arizona indicating the locations of many of the mines and of collectors investigating and working in mines sometimes quite deep underground to recover specimens, before mainly showing a series of images of the minerals on display at the 2012 Show.

Many of the Show display cabinets were dedicated to the minerals from either one specific mine or mining site whilst others showed examples of one or more species found at a number of mines and sites across the State. Many of the mines, as is the established custom in the industry, have colourful or novel names such as the Stonewall Jackson silver mine, the Red Cloud, North Geronimo, Copper Queen, Silver Bell, etc. Minerals shown included fine examples of azurites, malachites, aurichalcites, wulfenites, vanadinites, cerrusites and native silvers. Since many of the mine sources of the minerals had closed down many years ago this indicated the age of the specimens collected from them, many being over one hundred years old.

In the course of his presentation and in addition to describing the minerals the speaker constantly referred to the various museum's, dealer's and notable collector's Show cabinets providing at least some background information to most of the exhibits, exhibitors and the minerals, mines or mining sites featured in the various cabinets as he went along. A number of the collectors and dealers cabinets featured specimens collected over a hundred years ago which the speaker was able to point out providing some information or an anecdote about the specimens, the history, the original or current collector or exhibitor.

One show cabinet at Tucson last year featured specimens some of which had been put together for the Columbian Exposition held in Chicago in 1893. It was exhibited to help promote Arizona's claim to statehood, the U.S government at the time being inclined to amalgamate the State with New Mexico. Statehood was eventually granted in 1912.

A rather extraordinary anecdote that emerged when John Rankin researched his presentation concerned Society member David Colchester's father. Geoffrey Colchester was apparently a very well-travelled man, originally from Britain but who worked in a number of countries up to his being involved in the First World War and for a few years had been living in America. In 1914 Colchester senior was working at the Mammoth-St Anthony mine in Arizona as an engineer mine surveyor and sampler and at weekends he and a friend regularly went out to noodle on the mullock heaps for wulfenite. They were not doing this for specimens but to gather the mineral to sell as a lead ore to make a little extra money and the friend who was German was sending the collected wulfenite at intervals back to Germany to be processed. The co-operation ceased at Christmas in 1914 when war was declared and Geoffrey Colchester went back to Britain to join the army. David Colchester has speculated that his father may have had some of the wulfenite that he helped collect in Arizona shot back at him as lead bullets when he was with the British army in France!

At the end of John Rankin's photographic presentation David Colchester provided a little further information about the exploits of his father who had worked at several mines in Arizona in the years before he returned to Britain. These included the Copper Queen and Bisbee and for a short period he was in north Mexico dodging revolutionaries led by Pancho Villa.

Also at the end of the photographic presentation members were able to examine the array of Arizona specimens which had been brought in to display.
